

# Security Capabilities Network

The National Strategy Information Center (NSIC), a non-profit Washington-based educational organization, is assessing how to enhance U.S. capabilities – including intelligence, security, political action, and strategic communication – to manage irregular conflicts. This initiative is an outgrowth of the Center’s project “Adapting America’s Security Paradigm and Security Agenda.” See the 2011 book, short report, and video at <http://www.strategycenter.org/programs/adapting-americas-security-paradigm-and-security-agenda/>.

**Problem:** While the threat of conflict arising from authoritarian regimes remains strong, persistent irregular conflicts challenge U.S. interests. Many of these conflicts arise from conflicted or struggling states, fostering the rise of nonstate actors on local, regional, and global levels. **These are not temporary disruptions. They are key characteristics of early 21<sup>st</sup> century conflict.**

U.S. civilian security institutions and military services will continue to be called upon to help partner nations and nonstate actors establish security, stability, and the rule of law in irregular conflict zones ranging from the highly violent and kinetic to low-level embryonic aggression. To be successful, these U.S. units will need to be prepared, organized, trained, and equipped with doctrine, tools, and skill sets to successfully meet population-centric irregular challenges.

There has been a great deal of attention to this issue over the past decade. But, it is far from clear that these adaptations are adequate to meet the challenge. NSIC seeks to enhance the development of U.S. capabilities by (i) identifying gaps in existing security, intelligence, political action, and strategic communication capabilities and (ii) developing practical steps to address identified deficits.

**Method:** NSIC is convening current and former practitioners and specialists from within and outside the U.S. government to collaborate and to help develop doctrine, tools, and skill sets to successfully prepare for and conduct population-centric operations in irregular conflict zones. These individuals are drawn from key offices and agencies within the U.S. government, the Legislative branch, and from Washington-based public policy centers, nongovernmental organizations, and academia. NSIC will prepare a summary report of the findings.

**About NSIC:** The National Strategy Information Center, a nonpartisan institution founded in 1962, advances understanding and education about national security issues. The organization has a demonstrated method and successful track record for (1) anticipating U.S. security challenges; (2) identifying effective approaches and methods for managing and mitigating them; and (3) working with government, academia, civil society, and the private sector to adopt and institutionalize these capabilities.
